

Stanuaru 1. Accessing information		
Benchmark 1: Explains an information need	 Identifies book parts along with title of website, URL and copyright date of <i>sources</i>. Explores a variety of research <i>sources</i> including atlas, dictionaries, encyclopedias, <i>web browsers</i> and <i>search engines</i>, and begins to use <i>web portal</i> (SchoolRooms). Uses table of contents and index to locate specific information. 	
Benchmark 2: Understands the concept of keywords	 Develops strategies to identify keywords. Uses electronic catalog (<i>e-Library</i>) to locate <i>call numbers</i> and begins to find materials on library shelves. 	

Standard 2: Evaluating Information

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Benchmark 1: Identify and evaluate appropriate sources of information	 Identifies source of information. Introduces <i>self-assessment</i> for information-seeking processes. Uses headings, subheadings, captions, table of contents and index to determine usefulness of source. Identifies the appropriate use of research <i>sources</i> (including atlas and <i>databases</i>). 		
Benchmark 2: Identify facts and details that support main ideas	 Uses different clues to determine important ideas in illustrations and text. Uses organizational patterns and <i>note taking strategies</i> to make sense of information (compare/contrast). 		

Standard 3: Using Information

Benchmark 1: Communicates results of information search in format appropriate for content	 Recognizes the need for citing <i>sources</i> and begins to make simple bibliographies independently. Organizes information and presents results of an information search using a variety of formats and techniques.
Benchmark 2: Observes Internet guidelines and protocols as defined in the	 Increased development of concepts of privacy, manners and conduct online (District Acceptable Use Policy). Introduces concept of bias when researching topics online. Respects different points of view and opinions.

Benchmark 1: Uses both text and visuals to understand literature	 Increases understanding of literature by participating in discussion (opinions and responses, compare/contrast, making inferences and predictions). Uses text, visuals, and a variety of creative activities to understand fiction and nonfiction (activities may include <i>technology formats</i>). Is acquainted with award-winning literature (focus on <i>Coretta Scott King Award</i> and <i>Mildred L. Batchelder Award</i>).
Benchmark 2: Distinguishes between different types and elements of literature	 Reads or listens to traditional world literature/<i>folklore</i> (focus on variations on global tales) and <i>multicultural literature</i>. Reads or listens to nonfiction (focus on poetry). Reads or listens to types of fiction in picture book or novel format (mystery, realistic fiction and adventure/survival).
Benchmark 3: Selects resources and materials based on interest, need, and appropriateness	 Reads for pleasure, to learn and to solve information needs. Continues to formulate questions about reading independently and seeks answers with guidance.
